




Is knowledge translation without patient or community engagement flawed?

NAPCRG member, Vivian Ramsden, RN, BSN, MS, PhD, recently published a manuscript in Family Practice about the use and implementation of authentic engagement in the development of presentations and manuscripts which evolve from research that has engaged patients/individuals and/or communities.

This manuscript is the result of two workshops held in conjunction with the NAPCRG Patient and Clinician Engagement (PaCE) program held in in Saskatoon and Regina, SK during which community-based participatory health research integrated with transformative action research, were role modelled. Approximately 60 people comprised of patients/individuals, graduate students, health care providers and academic researchers were in attendance.

The Grant Generating Project (GGP), a year-long "fellowship without walls," is calling for applications for the 2017-2018 Fellowship. Since 1995, the GGP has trained over 100 fellows and produced over 800 grant proposals yielding more than \$1 billion in grants to Departments of Family of Medicine.

The fellowship is open to all faculty of family medicine programs, both university and community based, who are interested in pursuing investigator generated independent research on topics of interest to family medicine. Boot Camp Translation Training Spring 2017

Demand is growing for tools that effectively engage community members in health research. Boot Camp Translation (BCT) is one tool for truly effective patient-centered outcomes research.

What is Boot Camp Translation?

BCT is a process that translates medical information and clinical guidelines into concepts, messages, and materials that are understandable, meaningful, and engaging to community members and can be implemented and tested. BCT is a reliable method for long-term community-academic partnerships.

Who Should Attend Training?

- Academic health researchers, research team members, & community members. Junior faculty or early career researchers are especially encouraged to attend.
- Beginner to advanced experience with community-based participatory research and/or community engagement experience.
- Intermediate to advanced facilitation skills (small to medium group sizes).
